Wm. Fish Family Vault Restoration

The William Fish Family Vault is a partly subterranean,1840's tomb made of hand-made bricks. Through the years it had suffered vandalism, which had caused the city to brick up the door. The deteriorating condition of the roof suggested that it was probably leaking. The front had been bumped by passing vehicles and had settled to the point where the front wall was separating from the rest of the vault. Without intervention, the front wall would have eventually fallen, exposing the interior of the vault.

The Friends of Baldwin County Cemeteries, Inc., a nonprofit public charity, decided to undertake the vault's repair. Approvals of descendants and the city were obtained. Frank Knowles was contracted to do the brick masonry, and work began Sept. 8, 2008. The next day the door was opened in the presence of archaeologist Stephen Hammack. Just inside, still on its hinges, was the original marble door. Taking two steps down, Hammack found himself surrounded on 3 sides of the vault by stone benches. On the benches to the left and forward were bones and crumbled casket material and on the right bench was a Fisk metallic burial case. These remains were carefully removed for safe-keeping and identification to Williams Funeral Home and then to the human osteology (bone) lab of Dr. Matthew Williamson at Georgia Southern University. Dr. Williamson identified the ages and genders (where possible) of the bones and separated the bones into individuals.

As the brickwork moved toward completion, the Fish family was brought back to Williams Funeral Home where each person was placed into an individual casket. Everything removed from the vault, with the exception of the marble door, was placed back into the vault. The re-interment took place on Oct. 1, and the door was immediately re-bricked. This commemoration is to celebrate the lives and reinterment of the Fish family, the repairing of past vandalism, and the restoration of the magnificent Wm. Fish Family Vault.
